CMAO at the 91st ICMA Annual Conference Minneapolis

City Managers across the globe gathered at the 91st ICMA Annual Conference in Minneapolis, Minnesota, United States of America from 25th to 28th September 2005. This year with the invitation of United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and International City / County Management Association (ICMA) Mr. N.C.Vasudevan, IAS, Patron, Dr. Arun Kumar Panda, IAS, President and Mr. Piyush Ranjan Rout, Coordinator participated in the annual conference.



This year about 3000 participants congregated in the ICMA Annual Conference to share information on a wide variety of local government management issues and initiatives. The venue for the conference was Minneapolis with the theme "10,000 Lakes—10,000 Ideas."

The conference has four keynote sessions on a variety of topics. During the opening session, former Nike, Inc., "Katalyst" **Kevin Carroll** encouraged City Managers to feel "the spirit of play in the workplace," and bestselling author Robert Putnam addressed the issue of creating community in an increasingly isolating world.

Garrison Keillor delivered the closing keynote, address enthralling the audience with stories about

The 2005 conference also featured a new "Solutions Track" of sessions presented in two theaters in the exhibit hall, ICMA University fora, workshops, local field demonstrations, and other special events and meetings at locations throughout the Minneapolis/Hennepin County area.

The conference gave an opportunity to the City Managers Association Orissa to interact with the international delegations and staff of ICMA towards strengthening the organization in India. Attending the conference was useful in many ways such as learning & sharing, motivation and role of a professional manager in city management.

Chandigarh

- Ward: 20
- 25 Rehabilitated Slum Colony with Roads, Drinking Water and School
- Well Managed Parks and planned city

Amritsar

- Total Population: About 13 Lakhs
- Ward: 60
- Total Budget: 130 Crores out of which 70% its own income.
- Source of Income: Commercial Holding Tax, Octroi, Excise duty, water supply, Sewage Taxes and rent from property.
- Total Sweeping Staff: 1572 function through Mohalla Committee

Delhi

- Budget: 2200 Crores of which 60% is own income
- Waste: Solid Waste collection before 7 A.M
- Parks: 13000 Parks are under Municipal Corporation

Study tour of Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation to Hyderabad

A four member team consisting of Municipal Commissioner, Chief Financial Officer, Executive Engineer and Slum Improvement officer went to Hyderabad on a study tour programme on good urban management. They visited and interacted with the officials of Municipal Corporation of Hyderabad, Hyderabad Urban Development Authority (HUDA), Andhra Pradesh Urban Services for the (APUSP), Centre for Good Governance (CGG).

The study tour covered areas of Municipal Resource Mobilization, Accounting, Municipal Services, Community Development Project, Night Cleaning, Public Private Partnership etc.

Salient Features of the Study Tour

MCH has introduced self-assessment scheme since 2000-01 for undertaking tax collection as a result of which the collection increased from a mere Rs.50 crores in 2000-01 to Rs. 207 crore in 2004-05. Similarly Double entry accounting system has been introduced of late.

Through the E-Seva Centres in Hyderabad a person can pay 21 Nos. of different Govt. dues at one place.

Community parks were developed in joint venture between MCH and local Resident Welfare Associations of the locality. Resident Welfare Associations are maintaining the parks.

Similarly maintenance of street light / poles etc. have been privatized and public complaints are settled by private agencies within 48 hours.

Suggestions for Bhubaneswar City.

1. Immediate steps will be taken by BMC to reform the Property / Holding tax structure.
2. Privatisation of streetlights maintenance at least in 50% of the Wards.
3. Development of Community Parks in different areas with Resident Welfare Associations.
4. Citizen charter will be developed for the benefits of citizens of the City.
5. Tendering of developmental works will be done through website.
6. Training / orientation on double entry accounting system will be conducted.
7. Privatisation of Parking Areas will be introduced in 23 places of the city.

Experiences of Hyderabad Municipal Corporation

On 23rd October 05 (Sunday), a workshop was held in Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation to share the reforms initiatives of Hyderabad Municipal Corporation. Dr. P.K.Mohanty, IAS, Executive Director, Center for Good Governance shared his experience as Resource Person of the workshop. The



workshop was attended by about 80 participants comprising both corporators and officials of the corporation. Dr. Mohanty in his presentation focused on initiatives undertaken in making Hyderabad Municipal Corporation as one of India's Cleanest and Financially sound city. Focusing on the key areas of successful urban management he explained on the need for Resource Mobilization, Financial Management, Accountability, Residence Welfare Association and Property Tax Reforms.

He began his presentation by describing the background of the Municipal Corporation of Hyderabad. The biggest issues before him were bringing confidence of citizens, media, employees and improving finance, cleaning services.

After his joining as the Municipal Commissioner of Hyderabad, Dr Mohanty set the house to overcome problems of the city and brought both political and employees confidence to work on one common goal.

Secondly, he focused on cleanliness of the city, which resulted in achieving the award of cleanest city of India for three consecutive years. Thirdly, Self Assessment Property Tax System was

introduced which resulted in the collection of taxes within three years touching from 60 to 130 crores. Widening of the city roads was the fourth step to be taken. Fifth, the residential welfare association were set up. They worked for better municipal services delivery. Sixth, he worked for introduction of Municipal Bond to showcase the credit worthiness of Hyderabad Municipal Corporation. Lastly, he explained about the setting of the Accounting and Budgeting on the basis of Double Entry Accounting System.

He suggested Bhubaneswar Municipal Corporation to focus on Performance Measurement, Citizens Charter, e-Governance, Self Assessment, Municipal Bond (Later Stage) and Accounting Reforms. Later, discussion was held with the participants on various issues related to urban development.



Earlier, the Mayor of Bhubaneswar Mr Mihir Mohanty welcomed Dr. Mohanty, praised him as the most successful urban manager of India. Mr Satyabrata Sahu, IAS, Municipal Commissioner announced that a team comprising corporators and officers would visit Hyderabad to see the initiatives of MCH. The vote of thanks was offered by Mr Sanjib Mishra, Deputy Commissioner BMC.

Zero Garbage Town' Namakkal Model

Vision of the Namakkal city municipality is to develop Namakkal as 'Eco-City'. The 'Zero Garbage Drive' is Municipality's first step in this direction. With the concentrated efforts of municipal officials and citizens' cooperation, it was possible to introduce door-to-door collection of garbage, and segregation of waste at household level successfully. Attention is also given on the concept of minimizing garbage that reaches landfill everyday. To reduce the quantity of waste finally dumped at the landfill site, Namakkal Municipality is promoting vermin composting and recycling of waste

1. Situation Before The Initiative

Namakkal is one of the centers for the Poultry and Animal Feed manufacturing industry in Tamil Nadu. The town has a total population of 53,040. There are 30 municipal wards in the city. On an average, 20 metric tons of waste is generated in the city everyday.

2. Motivation For The Initiative

The vision of the Urban Local Body to make Namakkal a "zero garbage town" by 2003 was the motivation behind the initiative.

3. Description Of The Initiative

- It was intended to design a long term and sustainable strategy by involving citizens and other stakeholders for the 'zero garbage drive'.
- A major share of responsibilities were privatised:
 - a. Door to door collection of waste.



- b. Manufacturing of Compost by Vermi-composting.
 - c. Sale of recyclable waste.
 - d. Transportation & disposal of inorganic waste.
- Though municipality and private contractors provide the service, a major share of activities related to solid waste management has been privatized. As a part of the contract the contractor has to provide service to 75% of the city's area and municipality has to manage rest 25%.

The municipality handles 70% of waste whereas; contractor's responsibility is to handle 30% of the waste.

There are two compost yards in Namakkal town viz. Kosuvampatty compost yard and Lathuvady compost yard. Kosuvampatty compost yard spreads over 8.53 acres while Lathuvady compost yard is comparatively larger and occupies 13.41 acres of land.

Actions taken

An in-depth study was carried out to know the composition of waste generated from various sources.

- An Information campaign was launched to educate citizens about the importance of segregation of solid waste at source.

4. Results Achieved

- With the involvement of private parties and people being mobilized for keeping their city clean, the municipality is now able to provide a better level of service. There is a considerable improvement in the apparent environment in the city.
- Output of the Information and Education Campaigns (IEC) is people's support and active participation in the 'zero garbage drive'.
- Availability of compost in the local markets has discouraged the use of harmful chemical fertilizers in agriculture at local level.
